MINUTES OF THE EXECUTIVE MEETING JANUARY 14, 2013

- Those present: Steve Dover, Felice Ganz, Lynne Lukert, Paul Madison, Bruce Mensinger, Ellen Moe, Ken Rogers, Leda Rogers, Mary Ellen Shaffer and Rick Shaffer.
- The meeting was called to order at about 6:37 PM by Vice-President Steve Dover.
- There were no minutes from December to approve since the meeting was replaced by the holiday party.
- . Whether the Executive Committee meetings should continue to be held prior to the General Meeting or at another time was discussed. President Brad Smith can not attend Monday night meetings but Steve Dover reported that he is agreeable to the meetings being held as usual. Any other time would require the meetings to be held at the shop, a member's home or possibly the Boy Scout Shack when renovations are completed. It was generally agreed that the extra driving time a different night would require would be a burden. A motion was made, approved and unanimously passed that the Executive Committee meetings remain at 6:30 PM prior to the General Meeting.
- Steve Dover reported that the Shop Committee had proposed new rates for shop use for 2013. It was moved, seconded and unanimously passed that the club accept these rates.
- Show Chairman Ken Rogers presented a list of possible themes for the 2013 Fiesta of Gems. There was extensive discussion about additional ideas and then to reduce the list to allow a vote. It was agreed that the theme should not be a repeat of a recent theme, that it should be something which members might have to use in their display cases, it should be something that vendors might have and that it should have broad appeal to attract the public to attend. In the final vote, Beryl (aquamarine, emerald and more) won by one vote over Copper Minerals (native copper, turquoise and more).
- The question of raising the annual dues to be a member since the insurance costs were increasing was tabled for the next meeting

- Steve Dover announced that the duties for running the Executive Meeting would be shared by all the members. Volunteers were requested. The duties for the next few months will be: Paul Madison in February, Lynne Lukert in March, Ken Rogers in April and Ellen Moe in May.
- The Treasurer Darrell Robb was absent but had reported to Steve Dover that the club was solvent.

JANUARY PROGRAM REPORT

METEORITES - FALLS AND FINDS

Meteorites are a family passion for the Utas family. Peter and Barbara and their son, Jason, have been collecting and hunting meteors ever since Jason received a meteorite specimen for his 8th birthday. Jason is now a senior at the University of California at Berkeley, majoring in geology. They also maintain a web site - www.fallsandfinds.com - about meteorites with pictures of many of their collection and some specimens for sale.

The Utas family brought a wide variety of specimens from their collection for display along with pictures and educational boards. Peter and Jason provided a very informative program, with Barbara adding comments. The program provided a comprehensive introduction to Meteorites with definitions of the three classes of meteorites: irons, stony irons and stones (much of this information is also available on their web site).

To truly understand meteorites, you need to know the sources of the meteorites: the asteroid belt between Mars and Jupiter, Mars and our Moon. Peter did a great job of going back in time and explaining the formation of the asteroid belt and describing the history of how science arrived at the current understanding of meteorites.

To understand meteorites you also need to understand craters. Peter and Jason presented examples of craters from the well known (and miss-named) Meteor Crater in Arizona to the most recent discoveries, some of which

have been found using Google Earth.

Many photographs of meteorites were present to illustrate the processes which shape the specimens as they enter the atmosphere. Fusion crusts, ablation, fragmentation and weathering were all discussed.

The final portion of the presentation included slides from their actual hunts on dry lake beds, from the April 2012 fireball near Sutters Mill and from the most recent October 17, 2012 hunt in Novato. It amazed me to see their two finds while just walking the streets in the town of Novato following the fireball witnessed by most of the north Bay area.

There were numerous questions throughout the presentation since this topic is so popular. The enthusiasm of the whole Utas family and their statistics which seem to indicate that there are many, many meteorites yet to be found were an inspiration to all those in attendance.

SHOP REPORT

EOUIPMEMT AVAILABILITY

As of February 17 (as I write this report), all shop equipment is working and ready for use except for the 18" slab saw and the 6" trim saw. The 18" saw needs repair of the half-nut clutch pieces and replacement of the worm portion of the worm and worm-gear feed drive train. The 6" trim saw needs only V-belt replacement.

After reviewing financial records of past years, the shop committee met to discuss shop fees. Our club by-laws specify that the shop must be self supporting. This, in effect, means that the shop user fees must cover all shop expenses. The shop normally receives no budget from the general membership. We attempt to set the user fees based on the actual cost of the material and replacement expenses of the items used. Where the cost is low or can not be determined individually a general user fee is charged. Thus we have a 'General Shop Use' fee and several equipment use fees.

Note that the General Use fee applies to all users for the time they are at the shop, while the specific machine or material fees are charged in addition to the General Use fee.

At both the Executive Committee and the General Membership meetings in January the new fee schedule

was submitted for a vote of approval. Both votes passed unanimously. The new fees will take effect starting March 1, 2013.

Note that these fees apply to users of the shop for lapidary related purposes where equipment and material is used or worked on. Library users and those who are at the shop for club business meetings or club events such as helping move Fiesta of Gem materials to and from the Auditorium do not pay shop fees. However, all present at the shop must be recorded: sign in and sign out in the log book. This is an insurance and liability related requirement. No exceptions, no excuses.

Normal Hours

The shop schedule has returned to the normal preconstruction schedule: open five days each week. Random short term construction related closures may still occur; check the yellow notices on our website home page (see link below) for the most up-to-date information.

What remains to be done is the renovation of the bathroom (to conform to access for disabled users standards) and building ramps to enable wheel-chair access to the Scout House, our shop and the bathroom.

Using the Shop During the Construction Period

The remaining construction work has not yet been scheduled. Concrete ramp work may require closing the shop for a few days, possibly on short notice. During the remaining construction we can expect to have a variety of inconveniences, such as no bathroom, but the shop will be open during the regularly scheduled times as much as is safe and otherwise feasible. To the extent possible, closures and anticipated interruptions will be posted on our web site, www.culvercityrocks.org .

When you visit the shop, park in the parking lot parallel to Culver Blvd in front of the Scout House. The limited parking in the alley behind the shop is closed. Do not park in the alley except for brief loading or unloading. Enter through the gate in the fence in front of the Scout House. Use caution and be especially watchful for construction related hazards, including overlooked nails in the lawn.



MINERAL REPORT

"A Yellow Stone"

Rhyolite is an igneous, extrusive rock. It bears a close resemblance to granite because it is an extrusive equivalent of plutonic granite, or granite that has crystallized from magma below the surface of the earth. It was named by Ferdinand von Richthofen, a German geologist who traveled through the Rocky Mountains in the 1860s and noted occurrences.

It is normally buff to pinkish, though it can vary due to its composition. It has a Mohs hardness of 6, and a specific gravity of 2.4-2.6.



When it is ejected from the ground or volcano, rhyolite flows form highly viscous lava, due to its high silica content and relatively low iron and magnesium content. When this lava cools too quickly, it forms obsidian. Most eruptions that contain rhyolite are highly explosive, like the 1980 eruption of Mount St. Helens. During explosive eruptions, rhyolite lava produces pumice.

In prehistoric North America, rhyolite was quarried in eastern Pennsylvania. It also occurs in northern Italy, Iceland, Germany, the Rocky and Andes Mountains, Nevada, China, and New Zealand. During a gold rush in Nevada, prospectors founded a town called Rhyolite, which is now a ghost town that flourishes off of tourism to Death Valley.


In the Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone, downstream from Yellowstone Falls, the iron in the native rhyolite give the walls a distinctive yellow color. Most people mistakenly believe that sulfur influences the color of the canyon, but it is actually caused by the oxidation of various iron compounds.

BENCH TIPS

BENCH SHEARS

When cutting sheet metal, it's quicker and easier to use a set of shop shears as compared with using a hand saw. The cut is not as precise, but many times you don't need that. Shears will easily cut up to 24 gauge sheet, and some will cut 22 or even 20 gauge.

Current prices for shears run from \$13 - \$22 in jewelry catalogs, and the Joyce Chen scissors recommended on some jewelry blogs run more than \$20. But we found a cheaper alternative at the 99 Cent Store - some gardening utility scissors that were only \$1.07.



I buy a half dozen of them at a time for use in my jewelry classes. They're great for cutting bezels, trimming around a bezel cup, and cutting a piece off a larger sheet.

BEZEL CLOSER

A bezel closer is a steel punch that makes quick work out of pushing the metal down over a round stone and burnishing it. The working end is a concave cavity that fits over your bezel or prong setting and is pushed and twisted to capture the stone. Sets can be purchased but are expensive and contain many sizes you will probably never use. If all you need is one or two sizes, here's how you can make them yourself.


Find a good quality, round steel rod a little larger in diameter than your bezel cup or prong setting. Cut a 5 inch length. File both ends flat. Locate the center of one end, centerpunch a divot, and drill a small pilot hole about 5 mm deep. Remember to use a little oil as lubricant when cutting steel.

Select a ball bur a bit smaller than the steel rod but slightly larger than the bezel. Enlarge the pilot hole to a full hemispherical cavity. Test for proper fit with your bezel. Bezel should first contact the cavity about a third of the way in. When the size is correct, polish the cavity using Zam on a length of chopstick in your flexshaft. If the tool is not polished, it will leave scratches on your bezel or prongs.

When using the tool, the first step is to capture the stone correctly. I usually work by hand and push the punch straight down over the bezel or prongs. This causes the metal to start bending over the stone. Now inspect with a lens to be sure the stone is staying level. This is repeated until the stone is seated on its bearing and can't move anymore.

Next, you want to force the metal down onto the stone uniformly all the way around. While this can be done by hand, I often gently tap the punch with a hammer. Finally, I burnish the bezel by twisting the punch around.

SHOW REPORT

CCRMC FIESTA OF GEMS "AQUAMARINE"

This year's CCRMC Fiesta of Gems will be on Saturday & Sunday, July 13 & 14, 2013. The theme for 2013 is "Aquamarine - & it's colors".

Aquamarine, a Beryl gem, is one of the beautiful California, pegmatite, gemstones. Rick Kennedy's California Blue Mine, near Yucca Valley, in San Bernardino County, is currently producing some magnificent blue crystals. The Pala pegmatites are another source of Aquamarine, and the Ocean View mine has a rare "watermelon" Aquamarine with a peachy-pink (Morganite) center and a pale blue Aquamarine exterior. Also, I have found small Aquamarine crystals in a granitic pegmatite near "Haystack Mountain", just east of Lone Pine, CA.

Our show is only 5 months away and there are many tasks to be done. Our show committee is almost complete, with only 4 positions yet to be filled. Please contact me to volunteer for one of these last open Chair positions. The open Show Chairs are:

- <u>Demonstrators Chair</u> "With input, book the demonstrators for the show, and act as their host."
- <u>Prize Chair</u> "Solicits local businesses and show vendors for donations to be used as, door prizes, Raffle prizes, member incentive prizes, etc. Plus, on show days, set up the prize display cases, and oversee all drawings." (Volunteers should help this chair.)
- <u>Ticket Chair</u> "Distributes Raffle ticket books to members, collects all payments for ticket books, and makes sure all ticket stubs are entered in the drawing drums."
