## ROCK CARVINGS FROM ANCIENT OHIO: 100 BC TO 400 AD

An illustrated program by Karl Stull  
Writer, Editor, Archeologist, Rockhound

Historians can tell us all about the ancient “Old World,” but they know very little about the ancient peoples of North America, before Columbus. This program offers an overview of today’s scientific understanding of the ancient Hopewell culture through the lens of their rock carvings - focusing on their methods, styles, and particular achievements.

The first wave of European settlers traveling west, crossed the Appalachian Mountains and settled in the Ohio River Valley. These settlers found large-scale earthworks left by some ancient civilization. They uncovered huge burial mounds that held fantastic caches of luxury items: tens of thousands of fresh water pearls; copper ornaments; and minerals gathered from as far away as Canada and the Caribbean.

They also found carvings in mica and pipestone of fantastic beauty and mystery.



For more than a hundred years, archeologists have been theorizing and piecing

together information on the exuberant Hopewell period, a 500 year span of a culture that could be compared to Europe’s Renaissance, except that this sudden flourishing of the arts was created by people living in small bands, not in cities.

These native people hunted with spears and cultivated gardens, but they did not grow mass crops. Of the thousands of Hopewell burials documented in archeological records, not one shows any signs of death by violence.

Karl is a retired marketing copy writer who became interested in the Mound Builder cultures during the 1990s, while he lived in central Illinois, near the Dickson Mounds site. As an avid member of the Illinois Association for the Advancement of Archeology, Karl met archeologists from the nearby the Dickson Mounds Museum. They spent many long evenings talking about the Hopewell people of ancient Illinois and Ohio: their spectacular art, their

fascination with birds and underground animals, and finally, their disappearance.

## SEPTEMBER 10 PROGRAM REPORT

John Cook, a trained geologist from the Ventura Club delivered a lecture about the geology of Providence Mountains, California.

Providence Mountains are 11 miles long and 3 miles wide, located between the I-40 and I-15 freeways, in the southern eastern Mojave desert. It is a designated National Scenic Area; collecting cannot be done without permission from the State of California. There are three large mines in Providence Mountains, which operated from the 1870s to the 1940s and produced several tons of gold, silver, lead, and raw iron.

The mountains geological past goes back nearly 2 billion years. From 1.5 billion years to 560 million years ago, the mountain eroded down to flat land and 500 million years ago the area was invaded by the ocean. Around 220 million years ago, 12,000 feet of carbonate rocks were formed (limestone, dolomites and calcareous shales). Around 200 million years ago, the ocean receded and the area was uplifted. Then, 25 million years ago intense volcanic activity brought up gold, silver, platinum, pyrite and other materials. The volcano, estimated to reach 15,000 feet, went extinct, forming the current mountains.

As a result of the ocean invasion in the area, some of the oldest trilobites and brachiopods on Earth can be found at Providence Mountains, dating half a billion years. Horn corals, crinoids and gastropods from the Paleozoic era can also be found. Petrified wood from juniper and redwood formed 25 million years ago as a result of the volcanic eruptions.

Among Providence Mountains distinguished features are Edgar Peak and the Kelso sand dunes. Edgar Peak is almost 7,000 feet tall and primarily composed of lime stone. The environment is harsh, featuring intense winds and storms, flash floods in the summer and 60 degree temperature variations. The Kelso sand dunes are located 1,000 feet above the valley floor and cover 50 square miles. Strong winds constantly carve and reshape the dunes. Friction between the sand grains can be heard, in a phenomenon known as 'barking sands.'

Providence Mountains also contain numerous limestone caverns. They were first discovered in 1932 by Jack and Ida Mitchell, who found a 1,200 foot cave. The couple operated a cave tour business from 1932 to 1956, when the caves were acquired by the State of California. Delicate formations deteriorated from exposure to hot, dry desert air, so upon acquisition of the caves, the State Park system installed airtight doors in all entrances and exits, helping preserve the formations that exist today.
